The women's squad had a fantastic lead up to term, with a visit to Norwich for training camp that allowed us to clock lots of miles on long, straight stretches of river before getting started on bumps preparation. Thank you very much to the Billygoats in helping us to fund this!

Training camp was followed by an even more exciting event - a visit from the Lionesses of the University of Venice. We challenged them to racing in their galleone last September, and now they came for a return visit, putting on a very impressive performance in St Radegund's mile against a Fitz composite crew. We were also incredibly lucky to have Sarah Winckless joining us for the weekend, leading an alumni 4 in the race, and being a very welcoming and inspirational presence to Fitz and Venetian rowers alike.

Now, W1. This term we started strong with a great performance at Head to Head, winning the college event and being the fastest women's crew of the day. We also took a 4+ to Nottingham, coming in an agonising 0.9 seconds behind Maggies in a hard fought 2k race. Jessica Halliday represented FCBC in the Small Boats Regatta

on the Cam, where she won the Women's Fairbairn junior sculls event, adding to her Star Head title from earlier in the year.

We were lucky to have Lou Brett rejoin us from the Lightweight squad towards the end of term, but sadly this coincided with Eleanor Toms injuring her shoulder and being unable to row with us for bumps this term. We really missed her enthusiasm and incredibly contagious laughter in the boat, but were very happy to have Jemima Gasson stepping back up into the crew.

Bumps week got off to a strange start, with our being awarded a technical bump due to Christ's having an illegal cox (who helpfully advertised this by rowing up wearing trousers which said 'Peterhouse' on them). The following day we were chasing FaT, who proved a very tough crew – we made it to within 1 length of them for much of the race, but unfortunately never beyond this. On Friday we were faced with another tough race, with FaT catching Girton quite early on, leaving us to row over the rest of the course with an increasingly fast Christ's crew on our tail, who were themselves being hotly pursued by Catz. Some fantastic rowing and grit got us to the end of the course, setting us up to bump Girton on Saturday, just after Billyfield and leaving us in the highest bumps position ever seen by a Fitz women's crew.

Nottingham City Regatta

After a strong showing in Lent Term, winning Norwich Head and climbing two places back into the first division of the Lent Bumps, we started Easter Term with a spring in our steps. We made a few crew alterations after trials at our Easter Training Camp and welcomed back last year's Captain Joe Everest at 2, and Freddie Scott at 7.

Our first race of the term saw us head to Nottingham for Nottingham City Regatta, getting in some practice at side-by-side racing. In our first event up against Christ's and Royal Chester amongst others, we were determined to claim some scalps. We pulled ahead to a length clear of Royal Chester and a length and a half on Christ's with the other competitors trailing at the halfway mark. Christ's continued to fade, but Chester were not done and made a big move eating three quarters of a length out of our lead with 250m to go. A final increase in the rate by stroke man Derek and a subsequent burst for the finish saw us finish a third of a length ahead of Royal Chester, and so we got our hands on the crockpots with the impressive time of 6:26 over the 2km.

This Mays we were eager to reverse the misfortune of the previous year's broken rudder episode and to stop our slide down the May bumps table. Starting day one we were determined to bump Eddies before Corpus could have a go... and that we did, dispatching Eddies coming out of Grassy. Day two was always going to be the most difficult, with a fast St Catz ahead. We gained inch by inch all the way along plough reach, getting one, then two, then three whistles on the long reach, and getting overlap for nearly 100 metres, but the coin didn't fall our way and we had to settle for a row over. A fierce Caius M2, which featured some of their Lents headship crew, were chasing us the next day, and despite a valiant fight from our crew we did get bumped on the reach. But a loudly confident Pembroke M2 were no match for us on the final day as we rowed over, finishing five

lengths ahead of them, denying them blades. We moved up two overall in the year in Lents and Mays - the first positive tally in nearly a decade as the tide finally turns for the Fitz men.

From our May's first boat we have selected a coxed IV for Henley, which will attempt to qualify for the Prince Albert Challenge Cup on the 28th June.
